the lives of young people who went on to become influential members of the

the most rewarding moments in her life were the years she spent with her husband in the Ministry serving by Rev. Green's side as First Lady at Sardis Baptist Church in Dawson, Georgia, Jackson Memorial Baptist Church, formerly Elm Street

Baptist Church, in Atlanta, later founding the Greater New Light Missionary Baptist Church in her family's basement, moving to its present location at 2540 Campbellton Road, SW, Atlanta, where she served as First Lady until Rev. Green's

retirement in 1991, and thereafter was affectionately called "Our First Lady Emeritus"; and

s, this community activist was one of the original members of the Just Us Teachers

(JUT) Bridge Club, the Darnell Travel Club, was the oldest participant at the H. J. C. Bowden Senior Center where she was known as Soror Nan, a Golden member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated with 76 years of membership and service, and was a "Diamond Soror"; she also traveled extensively throughout

Europe, Africa, Asia, South America, and the Caribbean; and
