Joint Legislative Session Overview

- Georgia Supreme Court Chief Justice David Nahmias, presented the State of the Judiciary in a joint session on Tuesday, February 8.
 - He provided an update on the court case backlog throughout the State's courts due to the COVID-19 pandemic, noting new efficiencies utilizing virtual technology for certain proceedings that the Court would like to continue on a permanent basis.
 - Shared the Supreme Court's support for strong mental health reforms and related funding and highlighted the importance of the State's Accountability Courts.
 - Applauded Fulton County on utilizing \$75 million dollar of ARPA funding to support the County's Court System.

FY 2022 Amended Budget

HB 910, the Amended FY 2022 budget, passed the House of Representatives (152-4) and moved to the Senate for consideration. This bill is based on a revenue estimate of \$29.9 billion, an increase of 9.7 percent over the current approved budget. Highlights:

- Bill provides the Secretary of State's office with \$2.5 million to reimburse counties for postage expenses for mailing new election precinct cards to all active and inactive Georgia voters.
- \$5,000 raises for state employees; counties would also be required to give this \$5,000 increase to their constitutional officers, magistrate judges, and county commissioners beginning January 1, 2023. According to ACCG, the law requires counties to provide the same COLA to these local elected positions that state employees receive.
- \$4,800,000 in 20-year bonds to complete construction of a new public safety headquarters building in Atlanta, Fulton County.
- \$310,000 Added for technology upgrades to the Georgia Crisis Access Line in preparation for interfacing with the national 988 suicide prevention hotline.

<u>HB 933</u> - Retention of ballots; Rep. Blackmon, (146th)	This bill allows persons to inspect ballots and other elections documents (following election returns) held by the Clerk of Superior Court. <u>HB 1085</u> - Elections; option for municipalities to adopt and use instant runoff voting; Rep. Gullett (19th)	Bill would allow for instant runoff (or ranked choice) voting in municipal elections. Voters would indicate their preference for each office by marking a "1" next to their first choice, a "2" for the second choice, etc. for the political party in whose primary the elector desires to vote. <u>HB 1181 - Directors of development authorities shall not serve as chairperson or chief executive officers; Rep. It also requires consent of impacted municipalities and school boards for tax abated projects and deals. <u>HB 907</u> - Special Elections; related to sales & use taxes for transportation; Rep. Smith (18th)	<p>This legislation changes current law so that the 3rd Tuesday in March of even-numbered years is an authorized date to present a question to voters for Regional TSPLIST, Single County TSPLIST, and Transit SPLOST.</p>	House Adopted By Substitute; Senate Adopted
<u>HB 934</u> Sales and use tax; special district mass transportation; local government; Rep. Leverett (33rd)	<p>This bill is an ACCG legislative priority that amends the GA Code to allow a Single County Transportation Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (TSPLIST) to be collected for the full amount of time (five years), as opposed to terminating once the estimated amount is collected. In order to collect for the maximum amount of time, an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) would have to be in place between the county and cities, and all proceeds would be spent according to the IGA - on transportation purposes. NOTE: This bill is not retroactive but will apply to TSPLIST referendums once enacted.</p>	House Second Readers: Ways & Means

Cantrell (22 nd)	Bill calls for a referendum for a local homestead exemption: "Shall the Act be approved which modifies the maximum income for a homestead exemption for individuals age 70 or older to be the greater of \$100,000.00 or the maximum amount which may be received by an individual and an individual's spouse under the federal Social Security Act for the immediately preceding year?" <u>HB 1030</u> – Milton; repeal homestead exemption; Rep. Jan Jones (47 th), Rep. Cantrell (22nd)	Bill calls for a referendum: "Shall the Act be approved which repeals the homestead exemption for citizens of the City of Milton age 65 years or older meeting certain income requirements as found in Section 6.34 of the city charter?" <u>HB 843 - Property Tax: Deferral of Taxes for Taxpayers in Certain Cities; Rep. Holland (54th)</u>	<p>This bill would authorize any city that levies a Municipal Option Sales Tax (MOST) - currently only the City of Atlanta – to create a tax deferral program that may be (but is not required to be) based upon household income. Such homeowners would be able to defer paying that portion of property taxes that are more than 15% higher than the taxes in the previous year. Those deferred taxes could accrue to an amount that is up to 85% of the fair market value of the property. Such deferred taxes with interest would be payable at such time as the property's ownership changes.</p>	Second Reader in Ways and Means
<u>HB 887 - Authorize Homestead Assessment of 20 Percent of Fair Market Value for Individuals 65 Years of Age or Older; Rep. Stephens, (164th)</u>	<p>This bill allows for a referendum to be called by a Local Board of Education to authorize a homestead assessment of 20% of fair market value on residential homesteads owned by those 65 years of age and over. These referenda will only apply to local school district taxes for educational purposes and will only be applicable if a state-wide referendum to allow authorization of such assessments is passed.</p>	Second Reader in Ways and Means; Companion bill: <u>HR 571 Property Tax: Homestead Assessment for 65 and Over (CA)</u>

<u>HB 1094</u> - Revenue and taxation; notices of current assessment; revise language required; Rep. Leverett (33rd)	This bill eliminates the estimated tax amount on the annual assessment notice.	House Second Readers; Ways and Means
<u>HB 1280</u> Tax Commissioners: Provide for Collection Contracting Requirements and Compensation; Rep. Lim (99th)	This bill establishes a 3-way collection contract between municipalities, counties and tax commissioners regarding the annual collection of property taxes and fees. This bill also provides for the tax commissioner's compensation requirements to be included in the contract with a municipality or county, and caps their pay at 50% of their base salary. <u>SB 331</u> - "Protecting Georgia Businesses and Workers Act"; Sen. Albers (56th)	Bill prohibits local governments from regulating the hours or scheduling that an employer is required to provide employees or otherwise regulate employee output during work hours, with the exception of regulating business operating hours.	Second Readers: Insurance and Labor
<u>SB 332</u> - "Inform Consumers Act"; Sen. Albers (56th)	Bill regulates third-party, high-volume sellers operating on online platforms requiring certain business or tax identification, financial and related registration information within 10 days of beginning operations. Failure to comply will cause suspension on online marketplace platform. Marketplace must provide for electronic or telephonic consumer reporting of suspected suspicious activity. Effective: January 2023.	Senate Judiciary Favorably reported; Read Second Time

Study Committee: Consolidate Governments

<u>HR 630 - Joint Study Committee for Consolidation of County Governments and School Systems; Rep. Taylor, (173rd)</u>	<p>This resolution establishes a joint House/Senate study committee to review county and school system consolidation, including possible incentives and economies of scale that may come with consolidation. The study committee would consist of 10 members, including three House members, three Senators, one member appointed by GMA, one member appointed by ACCG, and three members appointed by the Constitutional Officers Association of Georgia. The committee would be abolished on December 1, 2022. All findings and recommendations must be filed by that date.</p>	Governmental Affairs; House Committee Favorably Reported By Substitute
