A RESOLUTION BY THE FULTON COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS URGING THE GEORGIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO PASS A RESOLUTION ACKNOWLEDGING THE ATROCITIES OF THE ATLANTA RACE MASSACRE OF 1906, HONORING THE VICTIMS, AND REAFFIRMING THE STATE OF GEORGIA'S COMMITMENT TO COMBAT HATRED, INJUSTICE AND WHITE SUPREMACY; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, Fulton County, Georgia, (the "County") is a political subdivision of the State of Georgia, existing as such under and by the Constitution, statutes, and laws of the State; and

WHEREAS, Representative Nikema Williams and Senator Jon Ossoff, Members of the 117th Congress, introduced House Resolution 1382 and Senate Resolution 790 respectfully to commemorate the 1906 Atlanta Race Massacre by condemning the atrocities that occurred; and

WHEREAS, as recounted in articles published by the Associated Press, History.com and www.civilandhumanrights.org, among others, beginning on September 22, 1906, a mob of more than 10,000 white men and boys terrorized Black communities throughout Atlanta for two days, ending on September 24; and

WHEREAS, during this period in history Atlanta had become the hub of the regional economy, and the city's overall population soared, which led to increased job competition among Black and white workers, and heightened class distinctions which led the city's white leadership to respond with restrictions intended to control the daily behavior of the growing working class, with mixed success; and

WHEREAS, what was labeled as a race riot, was a massacre of Black Americans at the hands of white supremacists who became incensed by the upward mobility many Blacks were experiencing; and

WHEREAS, the final death toll of the conflict is unknown and disputed, officially,

1	at least 25 African Americans died and unofficially 100 Black Americans may have been
2	killed during the massacre; and

WHEREAS, while the police, armed with rifles, and militia patrolled the streets and key landmarks and guarded white property, white vigilante groups invaded Black neighborhoods and wounded scores of Black residents and inflicted considerable property damage, which thwarted the economic success Black Americans had achieved; and

WHEREAS, the massacre ended when there was a collective call for an end to violence: and

WHEREAS, Atlanta, as a vital part of Fulton County, has emerged as a great southern city, celebrating the accomplishments of all its citizens, and it is important to remember our past so that we can fully embrace our future.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Fulton County Board of Commissioners urges the Georgia General Assembly to pass a resolution acknowledging the atrocities of the Atlanta Race Massacre of 1906, honoring those who were victims, and reaffirming the State of Georgia's Commitment to combat hatred, injustice and white supremacy.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon passage of this Resolution, the Fulton County Clerk shall provide copies to all the members of the Georgia General Assembly.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that all resolutions and parts of resolutions, in conflict herewith are hereby waived to the extent of the conflict.
