A RESOLUTION BY THE FULTON COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TO
SUPPORT THE ADOPTION OF LEGISLATION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO
CREATE TRANSPARENCY IN POLICING AND TO ADDRESS POLICE BRUTALITY
AND EXCESSIVE USE OF FORCE PERPETRATED AGAINST AFRICAN
AMERICANS AND OTHER PERSONS OF COLOR; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, police officers fulfill important roles in our society, including to serve

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- 8 and protect all Americans; and

9 WHEREAS, although the vast majority of police officers perform exceptionally, 10 transparency and accountability are valuable both to promote greater public confidence 11 in policing and to ensure the actions of certain police officers do not overshadow the 12 indispensable work done by the overwhelming majority of members of this profession; 13 and

WHEREAS, excessive force in a police-citizen encounter is among the leading
causes of death for young men of color; and

WHEREAS, Black people, including Black women and girls are killed during
police-citizen encounters at disproportionately higher rates than their White peers; and

18 **WHEREAS**, incidents of police brutality and the use of excessive force resulting 19 in the death of young men of color each year, and the demonstrations that followed have 20 brought sustained national attention to the tragic outcomes that can result from 21 encounters between police officers and African-Americans or other people of color; and

WHEREAS, the Fulton County Board of Commissioners believes that all persons should receive equal treatment under our laws and that steps must be taken, and programs must be developed and adopted to reduce and eliminate police brutality and excessive use of force by police officers, especially when they encounter African-Americans or other persons of color; and

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WHEREAS, in 2019, the FBI established the National Use of Force Data Collection, in partnership with law enforcement agencies, to provide nationwide statistics on law enforcement use-of-force incidents, but the program is strictly voluntary, and to date just twenty-seven percent (27%) of agencies have contributed data; and

31 WHEREAS, state-based decertification registries can enable law enforcement 32 hiring managers to discern whether law enforcement job candidates have been 33 terminated for misconduct; and

WHEREAS, Arizona and Nevada have recently established or enhanced their use-of-force reporting requirements to state authorities or the FBI Use-of-Force Data Collection program, with Nevada's law requiring agencies to submit use-of-force incident data to a central state repository and publicly release it monthly; and

38 **WHEREAS**, Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, and California have recently 39 enacted laws to establish decertification registries and practices or to enhance existing 40 ones; and

41 WHEREAS, the Fulton County Board of Commissioners, to promote better and 42 more transparent policing, and to eliminate incidents of police brutality and excessive 43 use of force, supports legislation providing a legal framework and the necessary capacity 44 for collecting and making publicly available aggregate data on police officers' use of force 45 in accordance with FBI standards; and

WHEREAS, to eliminate the hiring and retention of bad actors in law enforcement
agencies, the Fulton County Board of Commissioners supports legislation in the General
Assembly to establish decertification registries and practices.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Fulton County Board of Commissioners supports enactment of legislation by the General assembly to eliminate instances of excessive use of force, acts of brutality, and racial profiling, and to also require stringent oversight, reporting, and independent investigations into instances of police brutality, racial profiling, and excessive use of force against African-Americans, other people of color, and other historically marginalized communities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Fulton County Board of Commissioners calls on State legislators to adopt sound and unbiased law enforcement policies that reduce the disparate impact of police brutality and use of force on African-Americans, other people of color, and other historically marginalized communities, to include but not be limited to, requiring law enforcement agencies in Georgia to participate in the FBI's Use-of-Force Data Collection program, and enacting laws to establish decertification registries and practices or enhance existing ones.

62 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that upon passage of this Resolution, the Clerk to 63 the Commission is directed to provide a copy of this Resolution to the Fulton County 64 Legislative Delegation.

65 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**, that this Resolution shall become effective upon its 66 adoption and that all resolutions and parts of resolutions in conflict with this Resolution 67 are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.
